Ecclesiastes: A Study in Living with Purpose All is Vanity (Ecclesiastes 1 & 2)

What is Ecclesiastes? (1:1-2)

- A book of deep <u>wisdom</u> based on the personal <u>experience</u> of its author
 - oThe Preacher: One who speaks to the assembly
 - Hebrew: Qoheleth
 - Greek: *Ecclesiastes*
 - oSon of David, king in Jerusalem: Solomon
- It is a book that is best understood when one knows the end from the beginning (Ecc 12:13)
- The book's theme: Life apart from God is <u>unsatisfying</u> oVanity (*hebel*): "vapor" or "breath"; <u>fleeting</u>
 - Lacking in <u>lasting</u> effect

The Monotony of Life (1:3-11)

- Despite all our <u>efforts</u> and how <u>important</u> we think we are, the world will keep <u>spinning</u> without us
- There is a seemingly never-ending pattern of life oBoth for <u>humanity</u> & <u>Creation</u> (see Rom. 8:19-21)
- This thought ought to humble us but not depress us

Solomon's Wisdom & Experience (1:12-2:23)

- Solomon shares where he gets his wisdom from: o<u>Study</u> (1:12-18)
 - o<u>Reflection</u> on his life <u>experiences</u> (2:1-26)
 - The pursuit of <u>pleasure</u> (2:1-11)
 - The pursuit of <u>wisdom</u> (2:12-17)
- God had promised Solomon <u>wisdom</u> (2 Chron 1:8-12)
 OBut that wisdom was gained through <u>life experience</u> and <u>reflection</u>
 OThe gifts of <u>wealth</u> & <u>power</u> were means by which God taught Solomon wisdom of their
 - insignificance
 - o"Chasing after the wind"

Solomon's Conclusions (2:24-26)

- Solomon concludes that enjoying the fruit of one's <u>labor</u> is wisdom (v. 24-25) • A true gift from <u>God</u>
- Thus, pleasing God is what produces lasting joy (v. 26)

- Do we find our meaning in our relationship with God?
- Or are we pursuing fleeting things that leave us empty?
